Ya'll come see us now and then. Better yet, stay all night. Stay a little longer. Dance all night, dance a little longer...Pull off your coat and throw it in the corner.



I received the following e-mail from Eric Braun, and he graciously agreed to let me include it in the newsletter this month. Do go to the links below and look at the pictures—you will find them interesting.

"Seeing the link to a UK web site in the new edition prompts me to write and say that "wireless" collecting is very active here, too. Recently, I visited a museum that should be on the itinerary of any AHRS member who has occasion to visit the United Kingdom. It is located near Milton Keynes, about 30 miles north of where I live in London, at Bletchley Park, and was the home to "Station X" where the Brits cracked the World War Two German "Enigma" ciphers. It's an eclectic and fascinating collection of radios and computers, most from the 1940's, and also home to "Colossus" the first electronic digital computer in the world.

There is also a British National Museum of Computing on the grounds, along with a Churchill Museum and the National Museum of the Projected Image. Plenty to fill an entire day.

One more site of interest for the broadcast history fan is Alexandra Palace, where the BBC established London's first television broadcasting station in the 1930's. Purportedly, the early TV industry in Britain was a pre-war "cover" for the manufacture of radar components, as few sets were actually installed in private homes prior to the outbreak of war.
