"How are you Claude" I would ask, and his happy reply was always "Fair to Middlin". And when we would part we would always say "See you subsequently." Both phrases we each picked up during our many years associated with the broadcast business. We will miss him so.

GRAY, CLAUDE MERCER Claude Mercer Gray, 100, died on October 5, 2009. Born in Anniston, Gray was the son of Vannie Mercer and William Boyd Gray. He was a graduate of Georgia Tech in electrical engineering and made the first radio police call to a Birmingham police car in 1933. He spent World War II in civilian service with the FCC, then returned to Birmingham and started an engineering business for radio and television. He was a Ham radio operator and flew his own plane. He loved steam engines and drove the train at the zoo for 20 years, retiring from there at age 94. He was a member of the QB's, The National Railway Historical Society, the Heart of Dixie Railroad Museum, Amateur Radio Club, and the Alabama Historical Radio Society. He is survived by his wife of over 70 years, Sarah Hastings Gray and daughters, Mildred Virginia (Billie) Gray and Sarah (Sally) Gray Carringan, five grandchildren, and eight greatgrandchildren. In lieu of flowers, the family requests memorials to the Methodist Children's Home or the charity of your choice. A funeral service will be held on Thursday, October 8, 2009 at 1:00 at Elmwood Chapel with visitation beginning at 12:00. Burial will be at Elmwood Cemetery.
