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Shortwave Heroes

During World War II, ham radio operation was restricted by the U.S. government for security reasons. However, a group of shortwave listeners (Dxers) monitored the shortwave broadcasts from Germany, Japan and the Axis countries, listening for information on the health and location of American prisoners of war. If information was received, the listener would locate and communicate the information to the POW's family by mail or telephone, as soon as possible. The practice became known as "Prisoner of War Relay" or "POW Monitoring."

Some of the listeners belonged to clubs, such as "SWARM" (Short-Wave Amateur Monitors Club), which was organized by Ruby Yant of Lima Ohio. She organized the group and assigned monitoring times for each of the members, to insure no messages were missed.

My grandfather, Otis E. Denson, from Birmingham was a member of "SWARM." He was blind in both eyes, but wished to do his part for the war effort. In going through his papers, I located correspondence with members of "SWARM." I identified the call sign he used as W4SWL. I now have this call sign.

An excellent book on the subject is *World War II Radio Heroes; Letters of Compassion* by Lisa Spahr. A copy of the book is in the AHRS library.
