National Radio Day, primarily celebrated in the USA, is on August 20 of each year. On the Altius Directory Site, there are explanations on when, why and how the Day is celebrated, the Radio Invention Story (Dave does a much better job with this!), Benefits of Radio and Evolution of Radio (again, see Dave). The most interesting thing is how National Radio Day is celebrated. Of the several ways listed, the first one pretty much covers it: "The National Radio Day is celebrated by the easy listening of radio transmission." There are E-cards for National Radio Day. Send one to your favorite radio personality! National Radio Day originated in the 1990's by unknown radio station personnel and jockeys who wanted their own holiday.

OLD TIME RADIO BITS

Hello Folks!

Summer is the time for baseball. As I write this article, Major League Baseball is at the All-Star break and my team, the Atlanta Braves, is tied for first place in the Eastern Division of the National League. Hopefully your team is doing as well.

A few weeks ago, while listening to one of the streaming OTR sites, I heard an episode of Bing Crosby's show – Philco Radio Time. Of course being a Bing Crosby show, there were several songs by the "Old Crooner," but there was a baseball theme which ran through the show.

Bing Crosby was a big baseball fan and from 1946 until his death in 1977, he was part owner of the Pittsburg Pirates. Likewise his old buddy Bob Hope was also a part owner of the Cleveland Indians from 1946 until his death in 2003. The Federal income tax rate in 1946 for the top earners was 86.5%. It would seem that top entertainers like Crosby and Hope were looking for someplace to spend their money without paying it to the IRS.

The Pirates had opened the 1947 season in Chicago. Future Hall of Famer Hank Greenberg had driven in the only run for the Pirates with a double in the sixth inning. The Cubs were held scoreless and over 29,000 fans went home unhappy. This opening game serves as the backdrop for this Philco Radio Time show, which was broadcast on May 14, 1947. Bing's guests were Chicago Cubs sports writer Warren Brown, Hank Greenberg, and Groucho Marx. As always, Bob Hope and Jack Benny served as targets for Crosby's jokes. Likewise, any and every one served as targets for Groucho's jokes. The first eleven minutes are Crosby singing. The comedy skit starts at about 11:15 into the show and culminates with a Greenberg tribute song by Groucho and Bing – Goodbye Mr. Ball Goodbye! If you are really a baseball fan and want to sample old baseball broadcasts, click <u>here</u>. You will find regular games, All-Star games and World Series games from 1934 until 1966. Included on this site are all seven games of the 1960 World Series when the Pirates beat the Yankees. There is an interesting story about the seventh game. Bing Crosby was superstitious and didn't want to jinx the Pirates by watching the game. Instead he listened to the game on radio while in Paris. However, to cover his bases (pun intended), he had the game recorded using kinescope, a process where the image from the television monitor was filmed. Apparently after his Pirates won the game and the World Series, he watched the game and then put it away in his wine cellar where it stayed undiscovered for 50 years.
