The Colin-Kennedy that Ray Giles took on as a restoration project has been completed. I asked Ray to write something about how he found the Colin-Kennedy radio. The following is his account in his words:

"One day while working in the Annex building among our vast overflow of radios and parts, I noticed an old wood radio with four rather large holes in the front of the cabinet. Turns out it was a 1924 Colin-Kennedy battery set with a mahogany cabinet and solid brass face plate. The four holes were to accommodate the 01A multifunction tubes. We quickly decided this very rare set had to be restored and displayed. Our resident battery expert, Maurice Lovelady was the chief engineer; David "Doc" Holladay restored the cabinet to show quality. Gene Samples expertly rebuilt one large knob, and I put all the pieces back together. The radio will play and was displayed at the 2016 (Birmingham) Hamfest, receiving many compliments. This project represents one of the primary tenants of our club - to preserve for future generations, the beauty and function of early radio."

OLD TIME RADIO BITS

As I have written these columns on Old Time Radio, one thing has become painfully clear to me – I am not a writer. Sure I know a little about OTR, but having the ability to write what I know and make it enjoyable reading is very hard for me to do. So this month's article is going to be a little different. I hope you are reading on a computer, because there are a potpourri of links.

A few months ago I wrote about a series on AMC called Remember WENN. It was a nostalgia program about a radio station from the World War II era. I really liked the shows, as corny as they could be, and provided links to anyone who wanted to watch. Recently I ran across a much more detailed article from the New York Times about the series. If you are interested, here is the link to the article – <u>AMC Classics 'Remember WENN'</u>

When I was growing up, I was always fascinated by shortwave radio. The myriad of stations kept me entertained for hours. I could hear informative, entertainment and propaganda shows. However, there was one broadcaster which wasn't made to fit any of these categories – The Armed Forces Radio and Television Service, commonly known as the AFRTS. The network was run by the Department of Defense and was specifically for the Armed Services members and their families. Recently when browsing through the Old Time Radio Restoration (OTRR) group on Facebook, there was a link to an AFRTS production from 1951 titled If Freedom Failed. The program addressed communism and our freedoms. It has a specific message but it is an interesting 30-minute program. Clicking on the link shown previously will take you to the program and here is the link to the AFRTS Archive site. There is a lot of work being done to keep this website interesting.

Another site that I happened upon is <u>Past Daily</u> with the tagline "Because ignorance of your culture is considered uncool." That line is enough to make you want to look elsewhere, but checking out the site provided a lot of interesting programs which run the gamut from old news to old music. The April 11 entry is a <u>1937 news program dealing</u>

with FDR's attempt to pack the Supreme Court. The April 9 entry is a BBC interview with Buster Keaton from 1962. The April 7 entry is a speech from Wendell Willkie at Madison Square Garden in 1941. Scrolling back presents more and more OTR programs. Past Daily is updated daily and some very interesting material can be found there.

While this link doesn't apply to OTR, it is still worth noting – a video of the Demolition of Voice of America Radio Towers in Morrisville, NC. Don Keith, one of our club members, said the video made him cry like a baby. And since I have mentioned Don, we need to offer our congratulations to him as the ARRL 2015 recipient of their Bill Leonard Journalism Award.

And lastly, to prove my point about writing, here is the link to the latest issue of <u>Old Radio Times</u> from the OTRR. There are articles dealing with Bob Elliot of Bob and Ray, WLS in Chicago, Dana Andrews who was A Communist for the FBI, an article on the Development of Radio Networks, and Parley Baer who was Chester Proudfoot in radio's Gunsmoke, as well as the mayor on the Andy Griffith Show. These articles are well researched and well written. Here is the link to <u>older issues of the Old Radio Times</u>, in case you are interested.

I hope there was something in these links that is interesting to you. Until we meet again in the theatre of the mind...
