I have in our small radio display case at the Shop, the Channel Master, seven transistor radio, that I got around 1955. You can see the individual transistors on the circuit board. 

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OLD TIME RADIO BITS

Last month one of the annual rituals of summer occurred. The National Baseball Hall of Fame inducted its newest members. In this case, Ken Griffey Jr and Mike Piazza joined the hallowed ranks of the baseball's best players as selected by the Baseball Writers' Baseball Association of America (BBWAA).

The first players selected to the Hall of Fame in 1936 were Ty Cobb, Walter Johnson, Christy Mathewson, Babe Ruth, and Ty Cobb. However, at that time there was no physical location for the Hall of Fame nor the associated museum. In fact, it would be three years before a site was established. By that time there had been eight more players from the modern era of baseball elected by the BBWAA. In addition, Managers, Executives and players from the early days of baseball were selected by Veteran's committee.

On June 12, 1939 the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum was dedicated in Cooperstown, New York. In approximately 20 minutes,13 pioneers of baseball were noted, Judge "Mountain" Landis, the Commissioner of Baseball, and Manager/Owner Connie Mack made speeches, and all living players of the Hall except Lou Gehrig, who was too ill to attend, and Ty Cobb, who was late to the ceremonies, made their appropriate comments. Obviously today's ceremonies have grown in size.

Of course, since baseball was the unchallenged National Pastime, the major networks were there to cover the ceremonies. I am fortunate enough to have in my collection, a compilation of the day's activities. The program is about 75 minutes in length. The "real" baseball ceremonies begin about 7 and a half minutes into the program and as noted earlier last about 20 minutes. At about the 28-minute mark is the broadcast of a game played by 1860 rules, somewhat different than what we know today. At the 36-minute mark, the preliminaries for an exhibition game begin, followed by part of the game. It is interesting to note that Ty Cobb finally shows up and gets his air time at about the 53-minute mark.

All in all, the program is an interesting slice of American history to someone who grew up with the game of baseball. Click <u>here</u> to enjoy the program.
