## EIGHTH ANNUAL LEGENDS OF BROADCAST

President Dave mentioned several events in his opening message, and I want to expand on some of those. The Eighth Annual Legends of Broadcast was one of the best we have had! Several Legends attending told their stories about starting in radio, and some in TV, and one, Rob Conrad, how he has survived over 25 years at the same radio station. Most radio personalities have worked at many stations during that period of time, if they are still in radio at all.

Gary Richardson, Mayor of Midfield, a small town contiguous with Birmingham, owns and operates four local radio stations and told some things about his radio life. One of the most interesting stories came from Ken Osbourn, a blind radio announcer, who currently does voiceovers for several major cable TV networks. He also does some impersonations of famous people. Ken's best story involved his work on high school football broadcasts as the play-by-play announcer, live at the Friday night games. He listened to three audio sources at once to determine what was happening and what play-by-play to add to the game. He had a co-announcer in one ear, the spotter in one ear and he listened to the field PA announcer, all to help him "see" what was going on. He was a success at this and he built on this ability to overcome the obstacles he faced as a blind radio announcer. He attended communications classes in college, reading textbooks and articles in Braille and was so knowledgeable that the instructor would not allow him to answer questions; he had answered so often that the other students did not get a chance to answer. These stories and more were enjoyed by everyone there. There was a good meal provided by Marilyn's Deli and Dogs next door to the Shop, great fellowship enjoyed by all, and a promise to come to the Ninth Annual Legends of Broadcast on April 18, 2019. ## ALABAMA ARCHIVES TRIP

Dave Cisco and I visited the Alabama Archives, taking a self-guided tour of the Museum of Alabama, prior to a meeting we had scheduled with Sherrie Hamil, the Registrar with the Alabama Department of Archives and History. We met with Mrs. Hamil, Museum Curator Graham Neeley, and Archivist Haley Aaron in the Registrar's office. Our proposal involves the Alabama Historical Radio Society creating a "Radio History of Alabama" display, complete with physical items for display along with documents and other items to show this history. One of their questions dealt with was were items to be loaned or to be donated to the Museum, which is a question we must answer. If we can create this display and get it installed in a historically-correct location in the Museum, it will give our Society a boost in recognition, and it will fill a current void in Alabama history at the Museum. This will be a large undertaking, and if you have an interest in helping design and develop this display, please let Dave Cisco, Dave Johnson, or me know your interest. If you have not visited the Museum of Alabama in Montgomery, I would highly recommend that you schedule at least a half-day to do so. The Museum is open Monday through Saturday from 8:30 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. Admission is free.

### WEWN RADIO TRANSMITTER TOUR by Steven Westbrook

On April 12, a group of AHRS members visited the WEWN transmitter and antenna array atop Dunnavant Mountain in Shelby County. The tour was led by WEWN engineers, Terry Borders (Station Manager), Ed Mathis (Director of Engineering), and Yancy Davis (Control Room Operator).

<u>WEWN</u> is the shortwave radio outlet of the <u>EWTN</u>, the large Catholic international broadcaster that was launched by <u>Mother Angelica</u> on December 28, 1992. The station studio in Irondale, Alabama, sends their signal to the transmitter facility which has four transmitters of 500kW each. The station currently transmits English programming to Africa, South East Asia, the Middle East and Europe, and Spanish programming to South America, the Caribbean, Mexico and Central America. Programming is like that of the network's television channel.

On March 30, 2008, EWTN ceased all Shortwave transmissions to North America and expanded its English-language coverage of WEWN to India, the Middle East and Southeast Asia. Spanish Language coverage was also expanded to Cuba, South America, Mexico and the Caribbean. Previously WEWN only broadcast to North America, Latin America, Africa and Europe.

## OLD TIME RADIO BITS

This month we are stepping away from Old Time Radio to some newer radio. OTR will return next month.

On Friday, April 13, Art Bell passed from this world. Many, if not most people, have heard of Art Bell, but just in case you haven't, let's get some information from *Wikipedia* 

"Arthur William Bell III (June 17, 1945– April 13, 2018) was an American broadcaster and author. He was the founder and the original host of the paranormal-themed radio program *Coast to Coast AM*, which is syndicated on hundreds of radio stations in the United States and Canada. He also created and hosted its companion show *Dreamland*."

While this paragraph might not seem like a big deal, if you have ever searched the AM dial after 10:00 at night you will find several stations broadcasting *Coast to Coast AM*. If you take some time to listen, you might think that there are some really strange people who want to hear themselves on the radio. And you may be correct, but then again...

Art Bell began his broadcasting career in the early 1970's. Like many broadcasters, he started by playing music. From there he moved into talk radio dealing with conspiracy theories and gun control. As time passed his show morphed into one with topics dealing with the paranormal, UFO's, and pseudoscience. For people awake in the middle of the night, these subjects had great listener appeal. By the late 90's, his show was syndicated on hundreds of stations and his ratings were the highest of all late-night talk shows.

His show was different than the others in several ways. He presented a forum where people could present their views, no matter how fringe-related, without being ridiculed by the host. He listened and asked questions. He never seemed to get upset at the people on his show. He treated all with a great degree of respect. While other talk show hosts seemed to have a personal agenda, Art Bell went along with the callers who for the most part were serious in their views. Another aspect of his show was that he did not screen the calls. Except for the guests that he scheduled for the show, he didn't know what was coming next. All of this made for a wildly popular show that was completely entertaining.

By this time, you may have surmised that I was (am) an Art Bell fan. I enjoyed his show. His bumper music that segued from the commercials to the talk took on a life of its own. People identified and collected the music. Shows were recorded and openly shared by fans, so that people who couldn't stay up all night could still hear the show.

Since the shows were shared, it gave me an opportunity to add many of them to my collection. In fact, I have over 1,400 shows. Of course, I have not listened to all of them. In fact, I have only listened to a small percentage. However, I can always find something interesting to hear.

I have picked out a few that one might find interesting. The first is the <u>Leonard Nimoy interview from</u> <u>1997</u>. The next show from <u>1996 has Wayne Green as the guest</u>. Green, of course, was the editor of the ham radio magazine *CQ* and never was one to shy away from controversy. He was a frequent guest of Art Bell, who himself was an Amateur Radio operator. The next show is a composite show from <u>1997 and 1998 featuring Area 51 Government Employees</u> (complete with a stranger than normal call and a complete failure of the transmission facilities). For an hour of your time, this show is interesting. The last show from <u>1994 involves the Philadelphia Experiment</u> from World War II, where an invisibility

experiment resulted in the U.S. Navy destroyer escort Eldridge traveling into the future. All of these shows are examples of Art Bell's skills as well as his showmanship.

Some think it is appropriate that Art Bell passed away on Friday the 13. Maybe it is. I do know that he leaves behind a lot of fans who will miss him.
